

# \* \* \* \* "STAN'S" - The end of an era

All villagers were sad to hear that Stan's, the village shop, had to close at the end of March. Our very own Stan - Stan Moxon - had to make this difficult decision when his health and the present economic climate forced him to close down his shop in the High Street after a lifetime of service to the village. We all wish him a speedy recovery and a happy retirement with his wife, Jean, his two children and four grandchildren.

# THE VILLAGE PROJECT

Back in the late sixties and early seventies the then Parish Council and a specially formed Community Centre Association were at the head of a strong movement to get a community centre built in Pembury but for various reasons their efforts came to no avail.

In 1991 the Parish Council, acutely aware of the lack of facilities in Pembury, set up a small committee to prepare a feasibility study on the provision of a communal facility - but no sooner had the first steps been taken than the Tesco Supermarket and Park and Ride proposals appeared with regard to a site at Woodsgate, with the carrot of a community centre being built there if the Supermarket and Park and Ride options were given the go ahead. As we all know this project at the edge of the village was and still is the subject of enquiries by the Department of the Environment and the Local Plan Inspector. In the early stages of these enquiries discussions continued on the feasibility study although account was taken of the Woodsgate proposals.

In the last few months a working party of Parish Councillors has revived the feasibility study and continued tentative investigations into the need for a Centre for the community of Pembury, currently called the Village Project.

The working party, on behalf of the Parish Council, has a vision of a multipurpose facility where usage is not restricted to one activity at a time; where drama groups can perform simultaneously with recreational activities

in other parts of the same building; and where meetings can be held at the same time as a Youth Club evening. The combinations of usage by different groups within such a facility seem to be endless if the current ideas on the proposed layout of the building are retained. The facility would also be available during the day and would help to bring together the various clubs and groups in the village and reduce the need to go out of the village for the pursuit of enjoyment from leisure activities. Parishioners will have seen what the Parish Council have in mind at the Annual Parish Meeting in March when a model of the suggested building with its multi-purpose facilities went on show.

The working party's studies are very much in their infancy with the need to study sites and highway problems still to be examined but in due course every organisation in the village will be contacted so they can become involved in the project and when their needs are made clearer every parishioner will be asked to comment on the project and to give their opinion.

Too many opportunities have been missed in recent years; the Parish Council are of the opinion that this project could be just the boost Pembury needs without transforming the shape of the village.

### Dick Miles

One of Pembury's most well known residents, Dick Miles, recently took the decision not to seek re-election to the Pembury Parish Council and thus ended his 25 years of service to the community as a Parish Councillor.


Dick's family came to Pembury in the early 1920's. Dick was born in Romford Road and continued to live in Pembury until 1949 when, after marrying his wife Frances, he sought work outside the village. Dick and his wife returned to the village in 1959 when they took over Fletchers Farm on the Hastings Road where they have lived ever since. Their family of two sons and twin daughters all attended the local village school.

In 1960 he was elected to the Parish Council and for the next nine years gave his unstinting service to the village.

Reminiscing, Dick remembers that when he joined in 1960 the Parish Council did not own either the Village Hall or the Village Green, two institutions which are now part and parcel of our village. He also remembers that when he became a member of the Parish Council for the first time, two thirds of his fellow Councillors were all employed in the Village.

In 1969 Dick decided that his priorities were with his growing children and he did not stand again in that year's election but in 1979 he decided to again offer himself as a Parish Councillor and spent the next 16 years as Councillor, Vice Chairman and from 1987, as Chairman of the Council, a post he held until 1994.

At the meeting of the Parish Council in April last the Chairman, David Coleman, paid tribute to Dick for the work he had undertaken whilst on the Parish Council, making special reference to his enthusiasm and commitment as Chairman during what had been a very difficult and demanding period for the Parish Council.



Dick's wealth of local knowledge and the depth of his farming experience has been an extremely valuable asset to the Parish Council; his expertise will be greatly missed.

Well done Dick, after a quarter of a century's service to Pembury, your retirement is richly deserved!

### Janet Ditchett

Janet, Peter and Judith are members of the Catholic Church of St. Anselm in Pembury. Janet organises the choir but says she is not a vocalist. Since the age of seven, when she joined the Brownies, she has been a keen





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
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## MRS CHRISTINA LUNDBERG

On 1 April last Christina Lundberg completed 25 years service at Pembury School. In 1970 she was appointed to Pembury School as Head of the Infants Department eventually becoming Deputy Headteacher in 1976. Periods of Acting Headteacher followed during the Summer Term of 1984 and again during 1988.

Mrs Lundberg is renowned for her maths teaching. What is not widely known is that she wrote part of the SPMG Maths

Scheme, which is now one of the most widely used schemes in English schools. One of her exceptional contributions to Pembury school has been her effect on the quality of school productions and the very high standard of acting she has inspired by her leadership and direction. Her energy and commitment is boundless and leaves we lesser mortals gasping! Grateful thanks come from all of us for her commitment to the School.

# Tunbridge Wells Local Plan

Pembury residents will be aware that over the last three years the Borough Council has been preparing the Tunbridge Wells Local Plan. This is an extremely important document which, together with the County Council Structure Plan, will set the "planning rules" for our village well into the next century.

The Parish Council has been battling to ensure Pembury was adequately safeguarded in the Plan and made strong representations at last year's Public Inquiry.

The Inquiry Inspector has now reported back to the Borough Council. While a number of good recommendations have been made for the village, the Parish Council is extremely concerned about some important issues where the local advice has not been heeded.

As Local Plans are now "non-statutory" - that is the Secretary of State no longer acts as a independent arbiter and it is up to the Borough Council whether or not they accept their Inspectors recommendations - the Parish Council will have a lot of work on its hands in trying to persuade the Borough to make changes. Much will also depend upon the new Borough Council's attitudes.

Although there are many items which the newly elected Parish Council will have to pursue, the key elements of concern are:

A Park and Ride Scheme at Woodsgate Corner has been favourably received by the Inspector against almost total opposition (and the Secretary of State for the Environment's conclusions last year); Increased traffic problems in

Pembury have not been addressed in the
Inspector's report and indeed there seems
to be a view that the village has no
difficulties and all the additional vehicles
drawn in by park-and-ride could easily be

The policies for Pembury's rural fringe land are now unclear - the Inspector appears to be suggesting that the rural fringe policies (which provide a safeguard for limiting future building land) are no longer needed;

absorbed;

The Borough's attitude to
Pembury's future village facilities including sports and recreational - are
now unclear. It appears that as part of
the Local Plan the Borough Officers
have commissioned consultant studies
which say that Pembury does not need
anything because local provisions are

regarded as adequate ...!!!

These issues - and a whole list of further matters of concern - will need to be followed up quickly by the newly elected Parish Council once the Borough Council has decided how it is going to deal with the Inspector's recommendations.

A copy of the Inspector's report is available at the Borough Council Offices and if there are any matters on which you are particularly concerned please let the Parish Council know.

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## **GILL'S GARDEN**

By now bedding plants will be well established. Please ensure that they are given regular watering and remember it is vital to deadhead the plants in order to prolong the flowering season.

If you are thinking of making tubs or hanging baskets and have worries about keeping them watered during hot days, there are now some water storing granules on the market which can be mixed with the compost to help keep the plants moist. A little liquid tomato fertilizer mixed with the water helps to keep the plants in healthy condition and less prone to aphid attack. If you are using an insecticide and slug pellets please remember to use a product which does not harm children and pets.

It is now time to sow seeds of Canterbury Bells, Wallflowers, Forget-me-nots, Stocks and Sweet Williams in prepared seed beds ready for next Spring.

To help keep your lawns in good condition,

they will now need regular mowing but do not cut the grass too short as this will starve the roots.

One other good piece of advice - don't forget to leave yourself some time to sit and enjoy your garden in the lovely sunny weather we are all hoping for this summer.

# Police Update In Pembury

After your house, a car is likely to be the most expensive item you possess. Would you put £10,000 in a tin box with large glass panels, then leave it in the road outside your house all night? That may be a simplistic way of looking at it but, in effect, that's exactly what you are doing every time you park your car, if you do not take some simple crime prevention precautions.

Throughout the U.K. over a quarter of all recorded crime is related to thefts of and from motor vehicles - no wonder our car insurance doesn't get any cheaper! In Pembury alone, 21 vehicles have been stolen and 27 vehicles broken into since 1st January this year.

Don't make it easy for them! Use a visible deterrent such as a steering lock to interfere with the steering wheel/gear lever / clutch pedal. Shop around and choose something

that looks heavy and strong - invariably it will be. Consider an immoblizer that will prevent the engine starting. Car alarms have had some bad press due to their being too insensitive and sounding off at all hours for no reason - the newer breed of alarm is much better in this respect. Security mark you car radio and, if you buy new one, consider one of the removable types. When you park in a car park, if it is not too busy and you have a choice of space, go for the well lit areas where people walk past constantly, such as near the pay and display machines or exits.

Simple isn't it? A small outlay and a little thought will protect your vehicle and save you the time, trouble and expense of replacing it. The Crime Reduction Officer at Tunbridge Wells Police Station will advise on car protection and all aspects of crime prevention - telephone 01892 502153.

## Vandalism . . .

Sadly, since the last issue of this magazine there have been more instances of vandalism in the village, the main casualty being the Lower Green Recreation Ground Pavilion but happily there are indications that the number of offences have recently decreased although this may, of course, be a result of the lighter evenings at this time of the year.

However, whatever happens we as Parishioners must not let our vigilance drop. If necessary, call the police or the specials to deal with the problem in order that the offenders can be encouraged to behave in a more sociable manner.

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

Parish Church will be open to visitors every summer Sunday afternoon from 3pm to 5pm from now until 3rd September.



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# HOSPICE IN THE WEALD FUNDRAISING LAUNCH

On 25th April 1995 in the presence of the Mayor of Royal Tunbridge Wells, Councillor Hugh Wright, and the Deputy Mayoress, Councillor Daisy Fletcher, Mr. John Salter, Chairman of the Hospice in the Weald, launched an Appeal to raise £4.3 million to build the hospice at Pembury and to run it for the first year.

The 16 bedded hospice will complement the Hospice at Home service in providing palliative care for patients and help and support for patients and their families over an area of 400 square miles in Kent and East Sussex. The building will provide facilities for research and training for nursing staff as well as housing the administrative offices for the service.

Henry Cooper, the well known boxer, who is a patron of the Hospice in the Weald, spoke of the need for such a facility in the area and urged the community to support the project. 
